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PROJECT DIRECTOR'S UPDATE



Tēnā koutou katoa, it's been an exciting few weeks with great progress made on providing new warm, dry homes in eastern Porirua.

At the end of July, we held a blessing and open home for the first 10 homes completed in Castor Crescent. It was a great occasion, with many of those present the driving force behind getting the work off the ground.

The highlights of the day included Minister Faafoi's moving speech recalling the community-wide efforts to get the houses underway on the vacant lot, and seeing the tenants' reaction to their new homes.

Meanwhile, work continues on the remaining 43 homes in Castor Crescent and the 14 new one-bedroom homes in Champion Street, with move-in dates later this year or early next.

We are also pleased to announce 18 new homes in Niger Street, with initial work due to get underway later this year. You can read more about that below.

NEW HOMES COMING TO NIGER STREET

The next stage of development work in eastern Porirua is about to get underway, with the announcement of 18 new warm, dry state homes to be built in Cannons Creek. These are the first homes announced as part of the second stage of work in the area, and will be a range of sizes, from one-bedroom to five-bedroom homes. The homes will be built on existing Kāinga Ora land and, before these new homes can be built, eight existing state houses will have to be vacated and demolished.

Kāinga Ora will be lodging the first resource consent application in September 2020 for the 18 new homes to be built on the site, which has frontage to Niger Street, Castor Crescent and Miranda Street.





BLESSING OF NEW HOMES AT CASTOR CRESCENT



Ngāti Toa kaumātua Ta Matiu Rei opened the morning proceedings with a blessing of the 10 new Kāinga Ora homes at Castor Crescent, the first of 53 homes at the site.

Associate Minister of Housing (Public Housing) and Porirua MP Hon Kris Faafoi, Porirua Mayor Anita Baker, Kāinga Ora Deputy Chief Executive, Construction and Innovation, Patrick Dougherty, Kāinga Ora staff, key stakeholders and members of the community were also present.

This development has special significance for the community of eastern Porirua, with many of those attending the blessing having been involved in campaigning for the homes to be built.

NEW MURAL PART OF VISION FOR PORIRUA

Local Porirua artist Liana Leiataua, who specialises in siapo and working across various disciplines, was tasked with creating a visual landmark in the heart of the Cannons Creek shops, as part of the Ka Mua Ka Muri project last year.

Workshops were held to develop a vision of what the community wanted to see and could identify with. While many of the artworks went up last year, Liana's mural was only recently installed above the Cannons Creek Pharmacy.

Our current house is so cold and we've been getting sick during winter, so I'm looking forward to having a warm, dry home more than anything," says Toni.

PORIRUA PROPOSED DISTRICT PLAN – PORIRUA CITY COUNCIL WANT TO HEAR YOUR THOUGHTS



Porirua City Council (PCC) has publicly notified the Porirua Proposed District Plan, which will be open for submissions until 20 November 2020 and PCC wants to hear from as many people as possible. We encourage you to have your say.

The District Plan is the rulebook for how land can be used in Porirua City. It applies to every property in the city and sets the rules for subdivision, use and development. It also identifies those things in the city that we value, including significant natural areas and spring) as well as the flora and fauna of Aotearoa. The middle panel symbolizes the four winds, depicting the community coming through the tide of change. Community input, especially that of the rangatahi, was instrumental and at the forefront of this project for Liana. sites of cultural or historical significance and sets out how these will be protected.

The Proposed District Plan contains rules that apply to every property in Porirua and will inform how the city changes and grows. It includes rules controlling things such as the maximum height of buildings as well as rules to protect special features such as indigenous biodiversity and notable trees. It sets out those activities that are permitted and those that require resource consent from the council.

The planning rules and framework to support the wider regeneration work in eastern Porirua are included as part of the Proposed District Plan. We have been working with PCC to ensure that these proposed planning provisions enable the objectives of the regeneration project.


